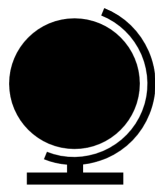







## ONCE an English student, ALWAYS an English student!

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### **Specific preparation for AQA English Literature A-Level (Specification A)**

If you would like to be considered for A-Level English Literature, it would be highly beneficial for you to read the novel 'Spies' by Michael Frayn as this is one of the texts that we study at the start of the course . You should make some notes on the re-occurring themes and the characters as you read. The York notes study guide on 'Spies' is very useful to aid your initial reading and study of this text.
